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Speakers Biographies

Mr. John Frittelli

John is a Specialist in Transportation in the Resources, Science, and Industry Division of CRS. He joined CRS in 2001. Before joining CRS, John worked for several years in the container shipping industry, working for an importer and also an ocean carrier. He has a master's degree in economics from the SUNY at Albany and a bachelor's degree in history from the University of Rochester.

Dr. James Jay Carafano

Dr. Carafano is a Senior Fellow for National Security and Homeland Security, The Kathryn and Shelby Cullom Davis Institute for International Studies, at The Heritage Foundation. His areas of expertise include Homeland Security, Defense, Military Affairs, Post-conflict Operations, and Counterterrorism.

Dr. Carafano is one of The Heritage Foundation's leading scholars in defense transformation, military operations and strategy, and homeland security. Recognizing that the war against terrorism will be a protracted conflict, his research focuses on developing the national security that the nation needs to secure the long-term interests of the United States-protecting its citizens, providing for economic growth, and preserving civil liberties.

An accomplished historian and teacher, Dr. Carafano was an assistant professor at the U.S. Military Academy in West Point, N.Y. and served as Director of Military Studies at the Army's Center of Military History. He also taught at Georgetown University and Mount Saint Mary College and served as a fleet professor at the U.S. Naval War College and a visiting professor at the National Defense University.

A graduate of West Point, Dr. Carafano also has a master's degree and a doctorate from Georgetown University and a master's degree in strategy from the U.S. Army War College.



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Dr. K. Jack Riles

Jack was appointed Associate Director of RAND Infrastructure, Safety and Environment (ISE) in July 2004. ISE is the RAND division with primary responsibility for homeland security, transportation, energy, infrastructure, economic development and public safety research at the RAND Corporation. The ISE division manages RAND's work for seven federal cabinet agencies, including the Department of Homeland Security, the Department of Justice and the Department of Transportation. Previously, he directed the Public Safety and Justice unit and the National Security Research Division's Homeland Security Center at RAND. These entities are now part of the ISE division.

Jack's role as Associate Director of ISE has placed him at the forefront of international and national homeland security and counterterrorism issues. Key issues that Jack is addressing include supply chain security; logistics and pre-deployment strategies for first responders; individual preparedness for catastrophic terrorism; strategic planning and intelligence reform at the FBI; privacy and security implications of air travel passenger profiling programs; racial and risk profiling by law enforcement agencies; improved methods for allocating homeland security resources; illegal immigration, deportation and detention; the changing role of law enforcement post September 11; the deployment of missile defense systems to protect civilian aircraft from surface-to-air missiles; and internal security planning and reform abroad. The latter work has taken Jack to such global hot spots as Afghanistan and occupied territories of the West Bank and Gaza strip. He has testified numerous times in front of both houses of the Congress, most recently to the Senate Commerce Committee on rail security issues in the aftermath of the Madrid bombings.

Jack is a founding co-director of RAND's Center for Terrorism Risk Management Policy (CTRMP). CTRMP is a collaboration with the public and private sectors that uses sophisticated risk modeling to address issues of terrorism insurance, liability, victim compensation, resource allocation and risk management. The CTRMP has produced several manuscripts and analyses that have helped influence the debate about TRIA (the Terrorism Risk Insurance Act), including *Issues and Options for Government Intervention in the Market for Terrorism Insurance* (RAND, 2004) and *Insurance, Self-Protection, and the Economics of Terrorism* (RAND, 2004).

Jack received his BA (economics and Russian) from the University of Michigan in 1986; a certificate of language specialization from Leningrad State University in 1986; his MS (foreign service) from Georgetown in 1988; and his PhD (public policy analysis) from the RAND Graduate School in 1993.
